GENERAL RULES

1. The Harding County Fair will open at 1:00 p.m., Thursday, and will continue through Saturday.
2. Exhibits must be entered between 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m., Thursday. All items must remain on display until 1:00 p.m., Saturday to be eligible for prizes.
3. If any animal or article is entered without competition, the judge will decide which award, if any, is merited.

Entries must have been grown or otherwise produced by an exhibitor during the past 12 months except those entered in non-competitive classes, Junior Breeding Classes or the Horse Show
4. Exhibitors and contestants must conform to the special rules and regulations of each department.
5. Decisions of the judges are final.
6. Do not attempt to engage judges in conversation while they are judging.
7. Only bona fide Harding County patrons will be eligible to enter exhibits.
8. All 4-H or FFA contestants must be bona fide Harding County 4-H or FFA members for the current year.
9. Only Harding County 4-H & FFA members who are in good standing may compete in the 4-H & FFA Department. Booster 4-H members may exhibit but will not be judged against regular members and Booster 4-H members may NOT sell animals through the sale ring.
10. Junior livestock superintendents will make all livestock stall assignments.
11. The eligibility of entering exhibits will be the responsibility of the superintendents in charge.
12. Tags for the identification of articles will be furnished by the superintendent when the article is entered.
13. Commercial establishments are welcome to booth space for a fee of \$25 with approval of the Fair Board.
14. The Fair Association will take every precaution to protect exhibits and to provide for the safety of visitors, but assumes no liabilities for personal injury or loss or damage to property, exhibitors, or visitors.
15. Collectible items may be displayed but will not be judged and the Fair Association will not be responsible for these items while on display.
16. Articles or animals which have been entered and/or exhibited at any previous County Fair will not be accepted for competition
17. Non-compliance with general rules, department rules and special rules, shall be sufficient cause to disqualify any exhibit.
18. No one will be allowed on the premises after 10:00 p.m.
19. Superintendents have the right to refuse any exhibits or display space that they deem inappropriate.

2. Exhibits must be claimed between 1:00 and 2:00 pm on Saturday.
3. All baked goods and prepared foods must be on disposable plates and covered with sealable plastic bags.
4. Canned fruits, vegetables, etc. must be exhibited in pint or quart regulation size jars. Jars must be tightly sealed. Jars will not be opened.
5. Jellies to be shown in jelly glasses or small jars with new lids and labeled as to contents.
6. Preserves, Butters, Jams, Conserves, and Marmalades are to be shown in standard half pint or pint jars, sealed and labeled.
7. In open class, exhibitors must exhibit correct number of items called for in each section. This will be listed in Special Rules at the beginning of each Department.
8. Grand & Reserve Champion ribbons to be awarded if deemed appropriate by the judge.
9. Age Divisions: under 10 years of age = Child
10 — 17 years of age = Youth
18 years of age and up = Adult
10. Solano Homemaker's Sweepstakes Award
Award is Open to 4-H Exhibits and Open Class Exhibits
Areas: Baking, Canning, Needlecraft, Arts & Crafts, Floriculture, and Gardening
Ribbon Points: First = 5 Second = 4 Third = 3
Age Groups: Child (under 10) Junior
(11–14) Senior (15 & up)

Eligibility & General Requirements

1. Exhibitors must be bona fide Harding County 4-H or FFA members for the current year.
2. Age divisions for all classes are determined by the exhibitor's official 4-H age as of January 1 of the current year.
3. Refer to the Fair Program for livestock entry times.
4. Stall assignments will be made by superintendents.
5. Entry fee is \$10 per exhibitor.
6. Exhibitors are responsible for the care and presentation of their animals.
7. Ownership deadlines for all livestock projects follow official NMSF (New Mexico State Fair) requirements. Animals must be identified by the Extension Agent or FFA Advisor by those deadlines.
8. All superintendent decisions are final.

Breed & Class Divisions

9. Livestock classes (beef, swine, lamb, goat) will be divided first by breed (if 4+ entries per breed), then by weight after weigh-in.
10. New breeds will be classified as exhibition-only until the Fair Board creates a new class.
11. Breed Verification Policy:
 - Breed must be declared at weigh-in.
 - Purebred animals must meet breed standards.
 - Visual inspection by superintendent or judge determines final classification.
 - Animals not verified will be moved to the Crossbred division.
 - Registration papers are not required but may be requested.

Animal Requirements and Conduct

12. Minimum/Maximum Weights (2% variance allowed):
 - Steers: Min 900 lbs.
 - Heifers: Min 750 lbs.
 - Swine: 200–285 lbs.
 - Lambs: Min 80 lbs., pay on 130 lbs.
 - Southdown/Dorper: Min 70 lbs.
 - Goats: Min 50 lbs.
13. One-time weigh-in only.
14. Livestock not within the weight range may show but are not eligible to be sold through the Fair Sale
15. Animals must be off feed/water 1 hour before weigh-in.
16. Animals must be free of excessive wool and dirt and dry at weigh-in. Blankets, covers, or wraps are not allowed during the weighing process.
17. Market animal exhibitors must sign a form stating no animal by-products were used in feed.
18. Market lambs, goats, and pigs must be under 1 year old (age verified by teeth).
19. Lambs and goats must be shorn to ¼ inch within 2 weeks of the fair.
20. Market goats must be dehorned or have horns tipped before arrival.
21. Hogs may only be sprayed with water during the show- no oil or powder.
22. Halters or collars may be used in the show ring.
23. All animals must be healthy and free of disease. Vet inspection may be required at the exhibitor's expense.
24. Heifers must be calfhood brucellosis vaccinated before one year of age and identified by tag or tattoo.
25. If a member cannot show or sell their animal, they must receive prior approval from the County Agent and/or FFA Advisor, and Fair Board. A substitute must be a member in good standing. All reasonable efforts must be made by the original exhibitor to show and sell their own animal before approval is considered.
26. If assistance is needed in the ring, a 4-H/FFA member may be appointed to help
27. Adults and junior leaders may assist with animal preparation, but the exhibitor must be present during the process.
28. All livestock must be checked out by a superintendent before leaving the fairgrounds. Livestock must remain in stalls until officially released-early removal = disqualification and loss of money.

Sale Rules

29. See Sale Rules Section for the complete list of sale rules and eligibility.
30. Livestock must meet weight requirements to be sold through the Fair Sale.
31. Breeding livestock must be bred at least 60 days before sale and confirmed by a licensed veterinarian.
32. Exhibitors who sell an animal in the Fair Sale and fail to complete their project—including submitting complete records—will be ineligible to sell that species the following year in either 4-H or FFA. Switching between programs does not remove this requirement.
33. Sale decisions must be reported to the Sale Superintendent or Fair Office within one hour of judging.
34. FFA chapters may sell one animal as a fundraiser.

Showmanship Rules

35. Showmanship for livestock is divided by age division: Novice, Junior, Senior. Showmanship for horses will include Booster, Novice, Junior, Senior.
36. The top exhibitor in each age division per species will receive a jacket and banner.
37. Showmanship Class Guidelines:
 - Exhibitors must show their own project animal.
 - Judging is based on control, presentation, and knowledge.
 - Attire must be neat and appropriate.
 - No assistance allowed once class begins.
 - Judges may ask project-related questions.
38. The judge's decision is final.

Disqualification

40. The judge has the authority to bar any animal that does not meet show standards.
41. Superintendents, with the County Agent or FFA Advisor, may disqualify any animal that is in poor condition or cannot be safely handled. All animals must be sound, healthy, and suitable for market.
42. Unethical practices (e.g., dishonesty, misconduct) will result in disqualification and forfeiture of awards/sale proceeds. Offenders may be barred from future fairs.

Booster Exhibitor Rules

43. Booster Division includes youth who are 5 to 8 years old as of January 1 of the current year and enrolled in the 4-H Cloverbud program.
44. Booster classes will be judged on showmanship
45. Boosters may show one animal per species.
46. Booster animals are not disqualified for being under/overweight.
47. Boosters are not eligible to sell.

HORSE SHOW

Rules:

1. All general and species-specific fair rules apply.
2. Project horses will be shown and judged during the 4-H & FFA Horse Show.
3. Horses need to be at the arena by 11:00am the day of the show.
4. If needed, the Horse Show Superintendent may authorize 4-H or FFA members to assist junior exhibitors in showing colts or horses.
5. All horse and colt classes will be judged based on breed characteristics.
6. The Booster division includes all horse classes and Showmanship.
7. Proof of ownership must be submitted before stall assignments are made.
8. Horses must have a valid Horse Certificate on file with the County Agent or FFA Advisor by June 15 of the current year.
9. Stallions may only be exhibited if they are one year old or younger.
10. If weather is inclement, trail will be cancelled.
11. Trail pattern will be built at the fair and posted.

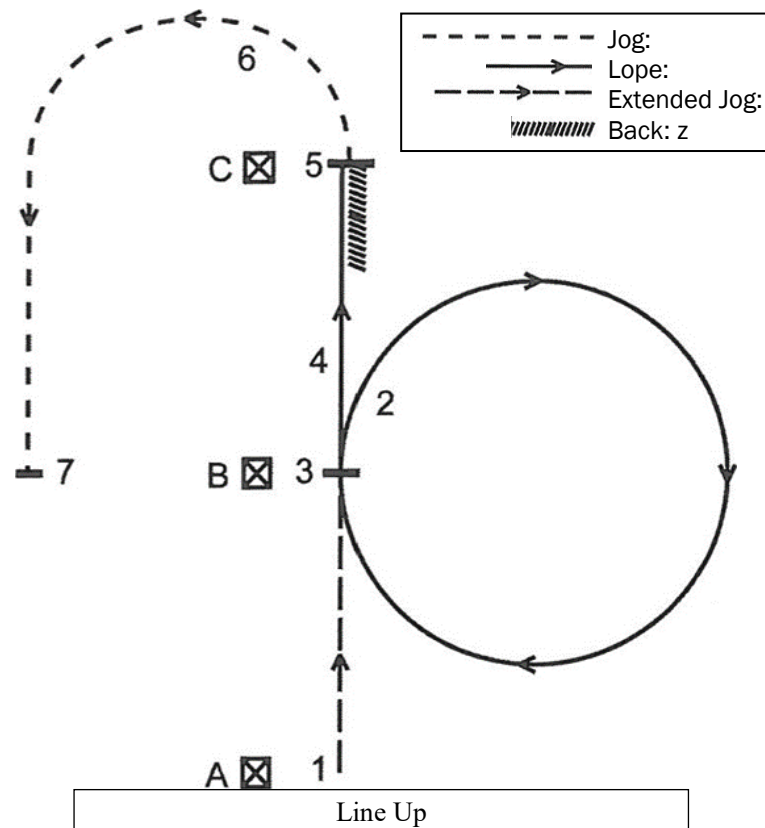

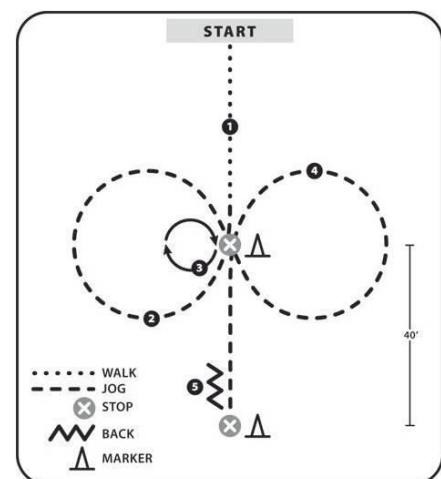


Ranch Horsemanship Pattern Novice, Junior and Senior:

- B. Calves must be born between April 1 and July 1, of current year .
- C. Exhibitor will be allowed to show only ONE calf.
- D. All bucket calves will be assigned to a specific area in the livestock barn by the superintendent.
- E. Calves must be tied with neck ropes and halters.
- F. All calves must be halter broken.
- G. Calves may be any breed or sex.

First place exhibits eligible for State Fair.

1. See State Fair Junior Department book, Supplement and General rules.
2. All exhibits in this department must be entered between 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. Thursday.
3. Exhibits must be claimed Saturday between 1:00 p.m. and 2:00 p.m.
4. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the project in which they are exhibiting.
5. Exhibits must be the current year's work.
6. Complete projects are required to be eligible for an award. Any exhibit lacking items listed in the project will not be judged. Self Determined projects must be accompanied by a completed. Self—Determined Project Record Form (300.SD—1)
7. Exhibitor is responsible for seeing that each exhibit is properly tagged with their name & age.

8. Exhibit Size Guidelines:

Posters may be no larger than 14"x22" (½ sheet) Posters are defined as any flat paper, foam board, cardboard, or other backing appropriate for hanging on the wall for display. Flat items placed on place stands or with stands attached will be considered posters and the stands will not be utilized for display.

Display Boards may be no larger than 18x48" (this is a small size display board, or half of a standard display board.) Display boards are defined as scored, freestanding science boards that may be purchased at any school supply store. These are boards made freestanding by the sides being folded in slightly.

Other Exhibit Boards are three dimensional vertical displays and may be no larger than 24"x24". A vertical display is defined as an exhibit with a solid base where the exhibit itself rises up. This would apply to small engines, Self-Determined, or any other appropriate 3-D Display.

Project Specific Boards are given specific measurements within the project. For example, Leathercraft and braiding have guidelines in the project book. If an exhibit is defined by the project book, that is the rule members must follow.

Oversized Exhibits may not be displayed. Large Wood and Welding exhibits are the exception.

Photography Exhibits See specific sizing guidelines under the Photography section. Photos may be mounted or matted with material strong enough to withstand transport and display (cardboard, mat board, poster board, etc.). We are not responsible for lost or damaged photos - please keep a copy of all prints submitted.

9. In case of no competition, an exhibit will receive a ribbon based on the quality of the exhibit.
10. Booster members may exhibit but will not compete against regular members.
11. Rosettes will be presented to Grand & Reserve Champion exhibits, if merited.
12. First place articles in each Department, for each age division (Novice, Junior and Senior), are eligible to go to the State Fair (if a CLASS is offered at the State Fair).
13. Mesa Soil & Water Conservation will award a \$50 savings bond to the 4-H or FFA Grand Champion project exhibit in Range Management, Forestry, and Plant & Soil Sciences.
14. Age Divisions: determined by your age as of January 1st of the current program year.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE

1. The 4-H & FFA Livestock Sale will be held in the show ring at the Fairgrounds.
2. To be eligible to participate in the Junior Livestock Sale, each exhibitor must fulfill the annual fair board fundraiser requirement, as determined by the Fair Board. Details of the fundraiser will be communicated to all exhibitors in advance each year.
3. Eligible species for the sale include:
 - Market Steers
 - Market Lambs
 - Market Swine
 - Cabrito (Market Goats)
 - Bred Heifers
 - Poultry Meat Pens
 - Rabbit Meat Pens
4. Booster animals are not eligible to be sold in the Junior Livestock Sale.
5. Each exhibitor may sell a maximum of two animals in the Junior Livestock Sale; however, they may not sell two animals of the same species.
6. All livestock animals in the sale will be sold by the head, not by weight.
7. If an animal is injured between the show and the sale, the exhibitor may substitute another eligible project animal, subject to approval.
8. Exhibitors must have their animal ready when called to enter the sale ring. Failure to do so will result in the exhibitor being moved to the end of the sale order.
9. All animals must enter the sale ring on their feet and fully alert—no unconscious, sedated, or carried animals will be allowed.
10. Breeding livestock should be bred 60 days prior to sale and guaranteed bred by a veterinarian.
11. Heifers must be calfhood brucellosis vaccinated before reaching one year of age and must be properly identified with a tag or tattoo.
12. Exhibitors are responsible for the care and safe delivery of all animals sold in the sale. Any exhibitor who is not present or represented at the time of delivery will have a portion of the sale price withheld to cover expenses. Arrangements will be made to ship animals following the sale or on Saturday at 8:00 a.m.
13. A 3% commission will be withheld from the sale of all animals to cover livestock sale expenses. This fee also applies to any packer sales coordinated by the Fair Association.
14. All livestock must be checked out by the designated fair superintendent to ensure that each animal is delivered to the correct buyer.
