It is our privilege to dedicate the fair book to an active member of the Harding Country Fair Board – Lyn Ray.

Lyn joined the fair board shortly after graduating from NMSU with a degree in Animal Science in 1990 when a fair board member visited her ranch to "look at horses." Before departing the ranch, he handed her the secretary box, and she began her journey! Since then, Lyn has worn many hats and taken on multiple roles. Whether it be building booths and floats; mowing or picking up trash at fair clean-up; checking on students' animals; running the horse show; cooking in the concession; helping at the sale; running the Little Wrangler Rodeo; working with queen candidates; or baking her famous cinnamon rolls for the annual Cowbell auction, Lyn has been involved in every aspect of the Harding County Fair.

For several years, Lyn served as the 4-H leader for the Mesa Roadrunner 4-H Club. In addition, she was the Harding County FFA Chapter advisor for 20 years before retiring in 2022. As the FFA advisor, she coached several judging teams but claims her favorite competitions were leadership development events because her goal was to "build leaders."

While retired from teaching, Lyn is not "retired." Along with her husband, Billy, she manages the Tequesquite Ranch (T.E. Mitchell and Son Inc.) which is a proud supporter of the Harding County Fair. She says her "happy place" is in the saddle, and she enjoys improving the cattle herd and horse operation.

Lyn raised two daughters that were active members in the Harding County FFA Chapter and Mesa Roadrunner 4-H Club. Her oldest daughter, Barrett, is a Doctor of Audiology for the Utah Schools for the Deaf and Blind, and her youngest daughter, Sherrie, is graduating from Texas A&M University with a M.S. in Agricultural Leadership, Education, and Communications with a focus in International **Agriculture. Lyn says, "The success of these kids is directly** related to the work ethic learned from working on the ranch and participating in FFA and 4-H in a community where kids not only have one set of parents – **but many.**"

Lyn is a devoted advocate for the agricultural industry and youth development. She says, "I love helping kids reach their potential – no matter their background or skill level."

GENERAL RULES

1. The Harding County Fair will open at 1:00 p.m., Thursday, and will continue through Saturday.

Exhibits must be entered between 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 2. p.m., Thursday. All items must remain on display until 1:00

- p.m., Saturday to be eligible for prizes.
- 3. If any animal or article is entered without competition, the judge will decide which award, if any, is merited.

Entries must have been grown or otherwise produced by an exhibitor during the past 12 months except those entered in non-competitive classes, Junior Breeding Classes or the Horse Show

- 5. Exhibitors and contestants must conform to the special rules and regulations of each department.
- 6. Decisions of the judges are final.
- 7. Do not attempt to engage judges in conversation while they are judging.
- 8. Only bona fide Harding County patrons will be eligible to enter exhibits.
- 9. All 4-H or FFA contestants must be bona fide Harding County 4-H or FFA members for the current year.

Only Harding County 4-H & FFA members who are in good standing may compete in the 4-H & FFA Department.

- **10.** Booster 4-H members may exhibit but will not be judged against regular members and Booster 4-H members may NOT sell animals through the sale ring.
- 11. Junior livestock superintendents will make all livestock stall assignments.
- The eligibility of entering exhibits will be the responsibility of the superintendents in charge.
- 13. Tags for the identification of articles will be furnished by the superintendent when the article is entered.
- 14. Commercial establishments are welcome to booth space for a fee of \$25 with approval of the Fair Board.

The Fair Association will take every precaution to protect exhibits and to provide for the safety of visitors, but as-

 exhibits and to provide for the safety of visitors, but assumes no liabilities for personal injury or loss or damage to property, exhibitors, or visitors.

Collectible items may be displayed but will not be judged 16. and the Fair Association will not be responsible for these items while on display.

Articles or animals which have been entered and/or exhibit-17. ed at any previous County Fair will not be accepted for competition

- Non-compliance with general rules, department rules and 18. special rules, shall be sufficient cause to disqualify any exhibit.
- 19. No one will be allowed on the premises after 10:00 p.m.
- 20. Superintendents have the right to refuse any exhibits or display space that they deem inappropriate.





- 3. All baked goods and prepared foods must be on disposable plates and covered with sealable plastic bags.
- Canned fruits, vegetables, etc. must be exhibited in pint or quart regulation size jars. Jars must be tightly sealed. <u>Jars</u> <u>will not be opened.</u>
- 5. Jellies to be shown in jelly glasses or small jars with new lids and labeled as to contents.
- 6. Preserves, Butters, Jams, Conserves, and Marmalades are to be shown in standard half pint or pint jars, sealed and labeled.
- 7. In open class, exhibitors must exhibit correct number of items called for in each section. This will be listed in Special Rules at the beginning of each Department.
- 8. Grand & Reserve Champion ribbons to be awarded if deemed appropriate by the judge.
- Age Divisions: under 10 years of age = Child 10 - 17 years of age = Youth 18 years of age and up = Adult

- 1. All contestants must be bona fide Harding County 4-H or FFA Members for the current year.
- 2. Refer to Program for livestock entry times.
- 3. Minimum and Maximum weights for livestock are as follows:

Steer: Minimum 900 lbs.; Maximum none. Heifer: Minimum 750 lbs.; Maximum none Swine: Minimum 200 lbs.; Maximum 285. Lamb: Minimum 80 lbs.; Maximum none, pay on 130 lbs.

Southdown: Minimum 70 lbs.; Maximum none.

Goat: Minimum 50 lbs. or Maximum none One time over the scale for each animal.

New for 2023 *Livestock not in the weight range, will be allowed to show, however, are not eligible to sale.*

Livestock will be allowed to weigh 2% under or over the weight limit. Any animal under or over the weight limit plus or minus the 2% will be disqualified.

- 4. Bill of sale must be furnished by exhibitor on each animal at time of weigh-in.
- 5. Fees: \$10.00 Entry Fee/ exhibitor
- 6. All animals must be off feed and water 1 hour before weighing.
- 7. Stall assignments will be made by Livestock superintendents.
- All lambs and market goats must be fully shorn to ¼ inch within <u>2 weeks</u> of the Fair.
- Animals that have excessive wool, dirt or are wet will not be weighed until the problem is corrected. No blankets, etc. will be allowed when animals are weighed.
- 10. Lambs, pigs & kids must be under one year of age. Ages will be checked by eyeteeth.
- 11. Market Goats horns must be tipped or dehorned prior to coming to the County Fair.
- 12. Animals exhibited in the 4-H & FFA division must be owned the minimum days before the first day of the State Fair as follows:

Steers & breeding cattle — 150 days; Sheep, swine & goats — 90 days, Horses — 90 days.

These animals must be identified by the Extension Agent or FFA Advisor no later than the deadline dates for ownership.

- 13. Before weighing or entering a market animal, exhibitors of must sign a certificate stating that, "to the best of their knowledge, all feeds fed to the animal had no animal by products."
- *14.* Breeding livestock should be bred 60 days prior to sale and guaranteed bred by a veterinarian
- 15. Heifer must be calf-hood brucellosis vaccinated before they are one year old and identified by tag or tattoo

- 16. Any new breed of animal coming to the fair will be classified as an exhibit animal only until the Fair board deems it necessary to form a new class.
- 17. Adults, Junior leaders, and others may assist younger people in preparing animals for the show. However, the exhibitor must be present while the animal is being prepared.
- 18. Exhibitors will be allowed to use halters or collars in the show ring.
- 19. Any 4-H or FFA member who is not going to be available to show and sell their animal(s) at the Fair may make arrangements with another 4-H or FFA member(s) who is in good standing to care for and show their animal(s) but must get prior approval from the County Agent and/or FFA Advisor and the Fair Board. All efforts must be made by the 4-H or FFA member to show and sell their own animal(s) before this approval will be granted.
- 20. Unethical practices will not be tolerated and will be cause for disqualification of exhibitor. Any proceeds from the sale or show will be forfeited. The owner may be barred from future County Fairs.
- 21. Boosters may show only one animal of each species. Booster market animals will not be disqualified if they do not make the weight limits.
- 22. The judge has the right to bar any animal from the show that he feels does not meet show standards. After conferring together, the livestock superintendents and county agent or FFA Advisor may decide to disqualify any animal due to improper condition or if the exhibitor cannot control the animal. All animals must be sound and merchandisable.
- 23. Exhibitors are responsible for the care and showing of their animal.
- 24. No oil or powder allowed on hogs during the show. Water only.
- 25. If assistance is required in the ring, the Livestock Superintendent may appoint a 4-H or FFA member to assist.
- 26. All livestock must remain in stalls until released by superintendents. Early withdrawal will result in disqualification and withholding of money.
- 27. Horses on horse rack only.
- 28. All animals presented for exhibition shall be free from contagious disease and shall, if necessary, be subjected to examination and possible rejection by superintendents. If outside consultation is requested, a veterinarian will be called in at the expense of the exhibitor.
- 29. Local FFA Chapters will be allowed to show and sale one animal as a fundraiser.

- 30. If a 4-H or FFA member sells an animal in the Fair sale and does not complete the project (including turning in complete records on that project), that 4-H or FFA member will not be eligible to sell that species of animal in the Fair sale the next year in either 4-H or FFA. In addition, that member cannot transfer to the other educational youth program (4-H to FFA or FFA to 4-H) and take the incomplete project the next year.
- 31. Livestock Showmanship judging will be at the same time as the showing of each species by an anonymous judge in the audience. Showmanship classes will be divided into Novice, Junior, & Senior ages. The judge will select the overall Showmanship winner for each species who will receive a buckle. Only the winners of each species will compete in the Master Showmanship contest.
- 32. A Master Showmanship class will be held at the conclusion of all livestock judging. Individuals entered in this contest will show one animal of each species, not necessarily their own. An individual choosing not to show a particular species will receive a score of zero (0) for that species. There will be a Master Showman selected and award presented to that individual.
- 33. All decisions of the Superintendents are final.
- 34. Exhibitors will notify the Sale Superintendents, within one hour after the judging, of their intent to sell or not sell their animal in the Junior Livestock Sale. No Booster animal will be sold through the sale ring.
- 35. All livestock need to be checked out by the designated fair superintendent before they leave the fair grounds to ensure that the proper animals are received by buyers.
- 36. Booster classes will be judged on showmanship.
- Overall showmanship winners for livestock and horse will be awarded a \$100 premium per species.






Ranch Horsemanship Pattern Novice, Junior and Senior:



- 1. See State Fair Junior Department book, Supplement and General rules.
- 2. All exhibits in this department must be entered between 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. Thursday.
- 3. Exhibits must be claimed Saturday between 1:00 p.m. and 2:00 p.m.
- 4. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the project in which they are exhibiting.
- 5. Exhibits must be the current year's work.
- Complete projects are required to be eligible for an award. Any exhibit lacking items listed in the project will not be judged. Self Determined projects must be accompanied by a completed. Self—Determined Project Record Form (300.SD–1)
- 7. Exhibitor is responsible for seeing that each exhibit is properly tagged with their name & age.

8. Exhibit Size Guidelines:

Posters may be no larger than 14"x22" (½ sheet) Posters are defined as any flat paper, foam board, cardboard, or other backing appropriate for hanging on the wall for display. Flat items placed on place stands or with stands attached will be considered posters and the stands will not be utilized for display.

Display Boards may be no larger than 18x48" (this is a small size display board, or half of a standard display board.) Display boards are defined as scored, freestanding science boards that may be purchased at any school supply store. These are boards made freestanding by the sides being folded in slightly.

Other Exhibit Boards are three dimensional vertical displays and may be no larger than 24"x24". A vertical display is defined as an exhibit with a solid base where the exhibit itself rises up. This would apply to small engines, Self-Determined, or any other appropriate 3-D Display.

Project Specific Boards are given specific measurements within the project. For example, Leathercraft and braiding have guidelines in the project book. If an exhibit is defined by the project book, that is the rule members must follow. **Oversized Exhibits** may not be displayed. Large Wood and Welding exhibits are the exception.

Photography Exhibits See specific sizing guidelines under the Photography section. Photos may be mounted or matted with material strong enough to withstand transport and display (cardboard, mat board, poster board, etc.). We are not responsible for lost or damaged photos - please keep a copy of all prints submitted.

- 9. In case of no competition, an exhibit will receive a ribbon based on the quality of the exhibit.
- 10. Booster members may exhibit but will not compete against regular members.
- 11. Rosettes will be presented to Grand & Reserve Champion exhibits, if merited.
- 12. First place articles in each Department, for each age division (Novice, Junior and Senior), are eligible to go to the State Fair (if a CLASS is offered at the State Fair).
- Mesa Soil & Water Conservation will award a \$50 savings bond to the 4-H or FFA Grand Champion project exhibit in Range Management, Forestry, and Plant & Soil Sciences.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE

- 1. The 4—H & FFA Livestock Sale will be held in the show ring at the Fairgrounds.
- Animals eligible to be sold are market steers, market lambs, market swine, cabrito, and bred heifers, poultry & rabbit meat pen onlyl
- 3. Breeding livestock should be bred 60 days prior to sale and guaranteed bred by a veterinarian.
- 4. Heifer must be calf hood brucellosis vaccinated before they are one year old and identified by tag or tattoo.
- Each exhibitor will be limited in the sale to a maximum of
 two animals but they can not sell two of the same species.
- 3% of each sale will be withheld on the sale of all animals to help pay livestock sale expenses. This fee will also be assessed to animals sold to the packer if the Fair Association is responsible for any of the transaction.
- Exhibitors are responsible for the care and safe delivery of all animals sold in the sale. Any exhibitor who is not present or represented at the time of delivery will have a portion of the sale price withheld to cover expenses.
 Arrangements will be made to ship animals following the sale or on Saturday at 8:00 a.m.
- 8. Exhibitors must have their animal ready to go through the sale ring when called. Otherwise, they will lose their position in the sale order and drop to the end of the sale order.
- 9. No animal going through the ring can be passed out.
- 10. If an animal is injured between the show and the sale, another project animal can be substituted by the exhibitor of the injured animal.
- 11. No Booster animals will be sold through the sale ring.
- 12. Livestock animals will be sold by the head
- 13. All livestock need to be checked out by the designated fair superintendent before they leave the fair grounds to ensure that the proper animals are received by buyers.
